We eagerly welcome any visitors from our Graduate Chapter and from any other of the Phis. Our annual Institution Banquet, which will be held May 30, is open to you all. We are looking forward to a large list of visitors which will contribute towards making this the biggest celebration in Phi Kappa's career.
