

Phi Kappa has been unusually popular with the Graduate Chapter this fall. Home-coming, Dads' Day, and Phi Kappa's formal dinner-dance have filled the Chapter House to overflowing on three separate occasions. Home-coming, with the Orange and Blue triumph over Minnesota, was unmarred by any blemish. The Hobo Parade, with sedate dignified seniors, temporarily transformed into frolicking youngsters, was a huge success. The sophomore-freshman class scrap followed immediately, and the frosh emerged grimed, scarred, but victorious, in an exciting battle with their opponents.

The Memorial Chimes, the result of the combining of the class memorials from 1914 to 1920, were installed and dedicated before a vast throng previous to the gridiron struggle.

Dads' Day, a new event on the university calendar, was ushered in on the day of the championship clash with Ohio's Scarlet and Gray warriors, and two thousand fathers concertedly availed themselves of the opportunity to visit their hopefuls and see where the money went. The Conference cross-country meet in the morning was won by Ames, the Illini harriers being second. A University R. O. T. C. brigade review of 3,000 cadets was given for the fathers. The game itself was apparently a scoreless tie until the last few seconds when a completed Ohio forward pass forestalled the whistle and won the game for Ohio. Twice have we won two championships in succession, and twice has Ohio defeated us for the third championship.

Phi Kappa's formal dinner-dance on the evening of December 3, was a distinct social success and the mailed suits donned by all Brothers and Postulants with great alacrity were relegated to the depths of the closets with deep regret.

President David Kinley, the university's new president, has launched a large expansion plan for increased appropriations to permit the university to build to keep pace with the growth. Plans for a new stadium were recently adopted by the
