Those duties, says "Curly," are: "to provide a place where intimate social relationship may be enjoyed, to take the place, as far as possible, of a home, and third, to bring together other directing forces which will tend to develop better and stronger characters and make more useful citizens."

#### Hell Week Scored

"Curly" has just completed his annual visit here (enjoyed as usual) and it was as a representative of the national Interfraternity Conference that he addressed the representatives of the University's 84 fraternities.

"Such nefarious practices as hell week" were scored by Brother Walden in his talk. As a substitute for such rough-house, he gave the constructive suggestion that a series of freshmen instruction meetings be arranged to prepare the neophyte for initiation.

Stan Hanssen's office was unexpired, and he will continue to serve as president of the Phi Kappa Building Association.


### Chapter Disappointed By Almost-Victory

#### University Property Worth 25 Millions

Property and equipment of the University now represent a total investment of \$25,117,354, according to the annual financial report of the University just published.

Its private endowment funds amount to \$304,330 from private gifts, in addition to an endowment of \$649,013 from the original Federal land grant. The sum of \$154,044 was received by the University during the past year from private sources for research in special fields.

And the gross income of the University for last year was \$7,115,864.

The University received from the legislature nearly five million.

Expenditures for salaries and wages in all its departments equalled \$4,811,613 last year while the expenditures for new buildings and equipment totalled \$1,261,016.

Student loan funds of the University now amount to \$183,872; loans numbering 232 and amounting to \$40,420, were made last year.
