Smoking Legal, After 39 Years, On 'Uni' Campus

BUT ONLY IN ONE ROOM OF OLD GYM, SAYS PRES. CHASE

Now for the first time campus smoking is "legal."

Stringent, generally obeyed, backed by 39 years' tradition, the University ruling of "No smoking on the campus or in campus buildings" has been one of the University's great bulwarks of conservatism.

Strides forward in science, in athletics, in learning have in recent years made the nearly 40-year-old "No smoking" sign seem a bit antiquated.

Grants Council Petition

Recently the ruling was rescinded in part by an executive order of President Harry Woodburn Chase, said to be himself an inveterate smoker. Answering a petition of the student council that requested permission for students to smoke in the Old Gym annex, scene of big social functions like the Junior prom, Sophomore cotillion, Freshman frolic, he gave his consent. His statement in part:

"While the policy of not permitting smoking in University buildings has been a regulation of the Board of Trustees since 1891, I believe, I find that this restriction has been waived in certain given cases. It was the practice of the University some years ago, I find, to permit students to hold smokers in the Gymnasium annex, for instance. This was especially true in the years before the Illinois Union had a building and when the students had no place of their own for such gatherings.

Rumor More Smoking

"In view of these precedents it seems to me that the request of the Student council is a very proper one and may be granted..."

Although there has been no suggestion of official sanction, nevertheless it is reported from time to time that both students and faculty members are smoking more openly, both on the campus and in buildings.

VICE-PRESIDENT OF FRATER-NITY DIES IN NEW YORK OF HEART FAILURE

Fraternity men everywhere have been mourning the untimely death of Brother Charles Hobby Bassford, late vice-president of the Fraternity.

Brother Bassford, active in fraternal work inside and outside his own brotherhood, was chairman of the public information committee of the Interfraternity conference. One of his last official acts was to attend a meeting of the Conference's Executive committee where he announced completion of his report of the Conference's last meeting.

His sudden death on the morning of December 19 at 2 Rector street, New York, which was attributed to heart failure, was announced to all the chapters by telegrams from W. M. Walden, national secretary. Funeral services were held the following Sunday in Grace church at Nutley, N. J. Phi Kappa sent a wreath as its expression of sympathy to the family.

Brother Bassford, who has left a widow and a daughter, was a lawyer by profession. At the last convention of the Fraternity he was nominated for the presidency, but declined.
