UNIVERSITY GOES ON WARTIME BASIS

After keeping students up in the air for several weeks with rumors flying thick and fast, the University Board of Trustees placed Illinois on a full year program. Classes in the present semester will end on May 23, and best of all, no 3-hour finals. (Not so good for Ye Ed, since they used to pull him through). In addition to holding Commencement earlier, about June 1, a 12-weeks full-time summer session. It will now be possible to finish a full four year course in slightly less than three years.

Undergraduate enrollment dropped to below the 10,000 mark this term. The classrooms are also feeling effects of war. Defense courses are overcrowded and other sections have to be discontinued due to the low number of students enrolled. Phi Kappa has been fortunate in that national defense has made no inroads on chapter membership*—so far no chapter member has been taken out of school for duty with Uncle Sam's armed forces.
