I-F COUNCIL ABOLISHES FALL RUSH WEEK --PLANS ARE MADE FOR PLEDGING THIS SPRING

Pre-semester fall formal Rush Week was abolished for fraternities on the U. of I. campus under new rules adopted by the Interfraternity Council. The new rushing plan is largely "open rushing" as it was back in the early days of fraternities.

Informal rushing will be going on thruout the school year, with Formal Rushing for the 1964-1965 school year starting the week-end of May 15 to 17, 1964, when high school seniors will be invited to attend a Spring Rush week at the U. of I. If a fraternity does not fill its quota during the May Formal Rush Week, open rushing and pledging of incoming freshmen is allowed all summer.

This would indicate that every alumnus must be on the lookout for good member-ship prospects. In addition those alumni will have to contact young men entering the University and not only sell the fraternity system, but specially on the virtues of ALPHA CHI RHO. Alumni will have to send names of these men planning to attend the U. of I. to the chapter so members of the rushing committee can contact them as soon as possible.

Without the utmost support of our Alumni members, you can see we just will not get the GOOD men into our fraternity that have come in the past, and, of course, the calibre of the chapter membership will suffer.

Informal rushing and pledging of men now enrolled on the campus has not changed, with informal pledging going on during the school year as usual.

NOW is the time to do your part to help by immediately sitting down and writing to our Rush Chairman. Let him know the men with whom you are acquainted who have the qualifications to become fellow Alpha Chi Rho members and who are now or will be attending the U. of I.
