

By using the ice rink and the west hall of the stadium, it will be necessary to accept only as many of the 975 FPHA units assigned here as will bring the September housing capacity up to 15,000. The present housing capacity of the University including previously acquired federal units is 13,862. Together the ice rink and the stadium can accommodate 738. The remainder will be made up of new federal units.

Enrollment for the summer session showed a total of 7,724 students registered on the Urbana campus.

Although the figures topped the previous summer session high of 5,036 reached in 1943, and was more than 5,000 above last summer's mark, it fell considerably short of predictions, most of which were about 9,000.

Many freshmen entering the University this fall who plan to pledge fraternities will be disappointed because of inadequate housing facilities, E. E. Stafford, dean of men and adviser to the interfraternity council, announced yesterday.

Stafford pointed out that many fraternities already have a housing problem with the return of active members who were in school before the war. Most fraternities will have little chance of pledging high school graduates.

"The outlook is very black at the present moment," he said. "More than 300 high school graduates already have sought information on rushing, and it's likely that many hundreds more will seek entrance into fraternities this fall. Fraternities probably will be able to accommodate only a small percentage of the total number."

There will be no formal rushing period this fall. Fraternities will conduct informal periods during freshman week to fill whatever housing is available.

Stafford said several fraternities have claimed that as many as 100 active members are expected to return, leaving no room for pledges.

Because of the housing shortage, pledges will be permitted to move directly into fraternity houses this fall. Fraternity rushing rules provide, however, that students must be registered for 48 hours on the campus before they can be officially pledged.

Fifty fraternities already have been granted permission by the committee on student affairs to operate this fall, and Stafford said eight other fraternities also may open their doors before the start of the semester September 25.
