

and will be primarily for students who will live in temporary quarters being put up on the old drill field on the south campus.

The university has received a check for a quarter of a million dollars to reimburse it for money spent in providing the first 275 temporary housing units in Stadium Terrace and Illini Village—the two “towns” of married veterans and their families. Comptroller Lloyd Morey said the check paid part of the \$325,000 to which the university is entitled in connection with providing 725 units.

Students living in university-owned residence halls will be given first chance to occupy the same space during the second semester, it has been announced. The university itself now provides living quarters for 2670 students. Of these 315 are provided quarters for themselves and their families.

A decision by the local carpenters' union that its members cannot work more than 40 hours a week has greatly delayed work on temporary housing units west and north of Memorial Stadium. The best that can be hoped now is that the units will be ready for occupancy by summer.

Student men and women living in university-owned and operated residence halls—those of the permanent type—will pay higher prices for room and board next semester, the university housing division says.

An average increase of \$28 per tenant, an 11 percent increase in charges, will be effective next semester. Rentals for emergency housing in the stadium, ice rink and gym annex will remain the same.

To cover operating costs, the university will charge the following rates for second semester: single rooms, \$325; large double rooms, \$300; small double rooms, \$287; and triple rooms, \$280.

A 15 percent increase in raw food prices since present rates went into effect in September, an expected increase in labor costs, and an increase
