⌘ LAST FALL the University stiffened its housing rules for single men. The rules had been relaxed in overcrowded Champaign-Urbana since the war. It reinstated a rule requiring that undergraduates live in quarters where there is an adult approved by the University in charge. At the same time, landlords were warned that the University is fast approaching the time when rooms again must be officially approved before students may live in them.

Enrollment at the University last fall was 22,215 students, an 11 per cent drop from last year, but still high enough to put the U. of I. in second place among state universities—surpassed only by California. Loss of veterans is the biggest factor in the decrease; there are only 6,774 veterans on all campuses at present, compared with 10,446 a year ago. The enrollment on the main campus at Champaign-Urbana is 17,158—a 12 per cent drop. Navy Pier registration fell from 3,790 to 3,493, while the Chicago professional colleges rose from 1,513 to 1,573.

A dozen Japanese graduate students are attending the University this year under the auspices of the U. S. government and the Institute of International Education. The group includes a number of former Japanese government officials, most of whom will return to government work after their year at the U. of I.
