

THE END OF THE SEMESTER. Christmas vacation, Thanksgiving vacation or just a weekend in Chicago. When the University of Illinois was finally located in Urbana-Champaign, The Illinois Central offered as part of its contribution to the land-grant cause \$50,000 worth of free freight service.

Almost 30,000 students live in this community. They live in a variety of housing organizations, ranging from the dormitories to fraternities and sororities. The University still claims to be "The Greek Capital of the World," with some 57 fraternities and 24 sororities on campus.

Junior and Senior women enjoy "key privileges," allowing them to stay out after regular house closings; but there seems to be few abuses of this new system. "Apartment age" was recently lowered from 23-years-old to 22, with the prospect seeming to go even another step lower.

These are just some of the changes.

The competition for grades has increased. Fraternities and sororities are in the midst of this scramble. For the first time in a number of years, the Greek men's average climbed above the All-Men's. Phi Kappa Chapter of *Alpha Chi Rho* placed a very

respectable 16th in the all fraternity house list.

But some things do not change. This year, "Stunt Show," which pairs fraternities and sororities in skits of their own creation, found *Alpha Chi Rho's* Phi Kappa Chapter in the finals with seven other paired groups.


Phi Kappa Chapter has been on the Urbana-Champaign campus since 1916. It has maintained its position as a solid member of the University's social and academic life.
